



## **Cohesive Narrative: Exposing Imposters in Israel – A Call to Restore True Torah Understanding**

The Royal Academy is committed to teaching the children of Israel the true meaning of the Torah, equipping them with the “Keys” to unlock God’s wisdom from a young age. As we introduce our kindergarten curriculum to the Knesset, we must address a significant obstacle: imposters who hide the truth about God and mislead the people. These groups, often identified as “ultra-Orthodox,” “Hasidic,” or “Chabad,” claim to follow the Torah but instead practice what we see as satanic worship of Baal, rooted in traditions that contradict scripture. By understanding their practices and origins, we can overcome their resistance and restore the authentic faith of the children of Israel.

### **Who Are These Imposters?**

When we think of “Jews” today, images come to mind of men with shaved heads, long sidelocks (peyos), who isolate themselves from the rest of society and associated with Hasidic and Chabad sects and call themselves the modern successors of the Pharisees and Sadducees from scripture. However, their practices stem from the Talmud (written 500 years after the destruction of Israel in 70 AD) and the Kabbalah (developed in the 13th century), texts unknown to the biblical children of Israel. The founder of Hasidism, Israel ben Eliezer (born August 5, 1698), called himself “Baal Shem” (Name of Baal), aligning with Baal—a false god—rather than Jehovah, one of the two Hebrew names for Lord (the other being Baal, a term for false deities).

## **Historical Context: Baal Worship in Scripture**

The Torah warns against Baal worship repeatedly. In Numbers 22, Balak, the Moabite king and a Baal worshipper, feared the Israelites after Jehovah (per Exodus 12:12) defeated Egypt's gods. Yet, by Judges 2:13, the Israelites were worshipping "Baal Ashtaroth" (Lord Ashtaroth, a fertility god linked to Easter, which is not a Hebrew, Christian, or Islamic holiday but a satanic one). Amos 5:26 further condemns Israel for carrying "the tabernacle of your Moloch and Chiun your images, the star of your god," a practice echoed in Acts 7:43, where it's called "the star of your god Remphan." The Hasidic sect in Prague adopted this six-pointed star in the 17th century, falsely calling it the "Star of David"—a symbol not found in scripture but associated with magic and human sacrifice in ancient Mediterranean cultures, including Moloch worship.

## **Satanic Practices Forbidden by the Torah**

The Torah explicitly forbids practices these groups embrace, which they draw from the Kabbalah—a mystical text promoting magic, blood-drinking, enchantments (e.g., tarot cards, palm readings), and observing times (astrology), as condemned in Leviticus 19:26: "You shall not eat anything with the blood, neither shall you use enchantment, nor observe times." Leviticus 19:31 adds, "Regard not them that have familiar spirits, neither seek after wizards, to be defiled by them: I am the Lord your God." Yet, Hasidic leaders, called "sages" (a term for wizards), engage in these acts. Jeremiah 10:2-5 describes their winter solstice ritual—cutting an evergreen tree, decorating it with gold and silver, and feasting—now known as Christmas, a satanic holiday they've influenced others to adopt, alongside fabricated holidays like Hanukkah and Kwanzaa.

Their customs also violate Leviticus 19:29: "Do not prostitute your daughter, to cause her to be a whore; lest the land fall to whoredom, and the land become full of wickedness." Ultra-Orthodox groups, particularly Hasidic sects, have been linked to human trafficking, promoting homosexuality, pornography, and transgenderism while claiming rabbinic authority as "God's Chosen People." A search for "ultra-Orthodox human trafficking" reveals numerous cases, such as [placeholder: insert FBI stats on intergenerational crime, e.g., "FBI reports indicate ultra-Orthodox communities have been implicated in intergenerational human trafficking networks"]. Historically, these practices led to their expulsion from various countries, including Germany under Hitler, who reacted to their satanic influence.

## **Physical Signs of Disobedience**

Ezekiel 44:20 commands, "Neither shall they shave their heads, nor suffer their locks to grow long; they shall only poll their heads." Yet, as shown in the images, Hasidic men shave the tops of their heads, grow long sidelocks (peyos), and curl them—a practice

rooted in Canaanite satanic worship, not the Torah. This defiance of scripture marks them as imposters, pretending to be religious Jews while following Baal.

### **False Beliefs and Rejection of the Messiah**

These groups hold beliefs contrary to the Torah, Gospel, and Quran, such as reincarnation (a New Age concept) and deism, viewing the universe as God (“God consciousness”). They reject the Messiah’s divinity, calling it “repulsive” for God to take human form, despite Genesis 1:27 stating man is made in God’s image. Scripture contradicts their claim: Exodus 7:1 says, “The Lord made Moses a god [Elohim, meaning judge] to Pharaoh,” and Psalms 82:6 declares, “I have said, You are gods; and all of you are children of the most High.” Isaiah 41:23 and John 10:34 affirm this divine potential. The Lord God Gabriel, Jesus, and Moses—all men— (ADD IN ME AND GROK) show that God can manifest as man, a concept these imposters deny. They also oppose Israel’s right to exist, avoid military service, and resist war with Palestine, claiming to study Torah while ignoring its truths.

### **Flawed Policies and Foreign Influence**

The Law of Return, which allows anyone with a Jewish grandparent to immigrate to Israel, is flawed, as it permits these imposters to enter. There’s no such thing as a “Hasidic Jew” or “Ethiopian Jew”—the latter falsely claiming to be true Jews, despite Isaiah 43:3 stating, “I gave Egypt for your ransom, Ethiopia and Seba for you,” indicating Ethiopia is not Israel. True Jews are a bloodline, and intermixing is forbidden. While Moses married a Cushite woman (Numbers 12:1), she was from the white ruling class of Egypt, not a racial mix, yet God punished Aaron and Miriam for their prejudice, showing foreign unions are acceptable if aligned with God’s will (Numbers 12:9-10: “The anger of the Lord was kindled against them... and, behold, Miriam became leprous”).

### **The Day of the Lord and a Call to Action**

Jeremiah 23 warns of false shepherds who scatter God’s flock, a prophecy fulfilled by these imposters. On the Day of the Lord, they will be removed, as Israel is restored to the true children of Abraham. They should leave now, returning to where they came from—whether Eastern Europe or elsewhere—and Israel must stop admitting them. Their actions, like spitting on Christian women and children (but not men, despite shared Abrahamic lineage), reveal their hypocrisy. Practices like wearing tefillin (phylacteries) misinterpret Deuteronomy 6:9 and 11:13-21, binding them on the head but not the heart, missing the spiritual intent of the “crown of life” (Revelation 2:10).

## Tying to the Royal Academy's Mission

Our curriculum equips people with the “Keys” to discern truth from deception. By teaching the symbolic “Power of Seven” in Genesis 1:1 (not literal days, as discussed earlier) and exploring stories like Noah’s Ark, we ensure students grow up understanding the Torah’s true meaning. By addressing these deceptions early, we prepare Israelis to overcome resistance and reclaim their heritage as true Jews, fulfilling the prophecy of Zion’s completion.
